The 2013/14 financial year has been yet another year of growth for Dandelion and it doesn't look like things will be slowing down anytime soon. After being awarded the Sutherland Shire Community Group of the Year for 2014, we were catapulted into a busy year and reached some terrific achievements.

It is fabulous that we are keeping up with the increase in families requiring our assistance and this wouldn't be possible without our terrific volunteers, supporters and members of the community backing us.

It was also a successful year for grants, which has helped us provide families in need with items such as cots, bassinets and car seats. These items are always in high demand. We would like to thank the Tradies, Brighton Le Sands RSL, Club Central Hurstville and Moorebank Sports Club for their contributions via ClubGRANTS and Streetsmart for their grants to assist people who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless.

Our 2013 Christmas Appeal was embraced greatly by our community and we were able to bring smiles to over 500 children during a time of year which is difficult for so many struggling families. We were also touched to have a large number of volunteers come and help us man our stall at Cronulla for the Sutherland Shire Australia Day 2014 celebrations. The event helped us to not only



raise much needed funds but also helped to increase awareness of our work.

While the main focus of Dandelion is on assisting families in need, we try to achieve this with minimal environmental impact. This year we are pleased to have welcomed our new partners Thorndale Foundation Clothing Recycling, The Outback Baby Project in Cowra and Peninsular Toys who have assisted us in reducing our environmental imprint.

An organisation is only as good as the people who work there and I am proud to volunteer beside such talented and caring people. This year we have been fortunate to have a number of corporate, community and church groups join us for

working bees and volunteering days, which has been an enormous help in processing stock. I would like to mention in particular the Tradies team who volunteer for a day every second week. We are truly thankful for the support they have given us over the past year.

We would also like to thank the tireless social workers and community service agencies who partner with Dandelion and deliver our packages to their vulnerable clients. It is lovely to see how many of these partners support Dandelion in numerous ways from holding consumable collections or morning teas for our volunteers, to volunteering their time at Donation Days. As these partnerships continue to strengthen we look forward to another great year ahead.

Our challenges for the coming months will be finding new premises for our operations and of course, to continue to grow our volunteer base. About us

Our network was established by two mothers who noticed an opportunity to enhance the great work of the community services industry in supporting vulnerable families by being able to provide material goods to those families. From this desire to make a difference combined with a passion for sustainability, Dandelion was born.

The Dandelion Support Network is run entirely by volunteers, who accept, sort, clean and safety check

pre-loved nursery equipment and children's clothes for distribution through local hospitals and support agencies. We receive no recurrent funding for the services we provide.

Once donated, the items are given a new lease on life. All the goods are processed by volunteers who follow strict quality assurance standards so that they can be enjoyed by their new owner. Once the items are ready for their new home they are packed up with love ready for a new family.



Your group kindly assisted my wife and me with some baby needs back in July of this year. Our son is 14 weeks old this Friday, he is vibrant, healthy, and growing quickly.

Your very kind generosity has seen us very well equipped for our son's needs and we would now like to return those items he is growing out of. The kindness, generosity and thoughtfulness of your group, and the donors who have contributed, has affected us every day in a most positive and helpful way. Our son has of course benefited from this in a most significant way and as parents we are both most sincerely grateful. 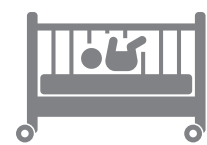
Grants

Our Future – Finding a New Home



With families across NSW struggling to cope under various circumstances, the need for our services continues to grow each month. We are pleased that our work is touching more and more lives, but with this growth comes challenges. The ongoing viability and sustainability of our organisation relies on the generosity of individuals, businesses and community groups either through gifts in kind, financial contributions or by volunteering.

A major challenge that we face in the coming months, is to find a new home for our operations. We have been very fortunate to have the support of our local Rotary Clubs in securing our current home. Unfortunately, our current rental is flagged for redevelopment. We are looking to move to a more permanent property that suits our budget restrictions. We would welcome any support from individuals or businesses who may be able to assist with this endeavour.

Our Social and Environmental Impact

Dandelion Support Network is committed to positive environmental and social change.

We aim to create sustainable and empowered communities and apply sustainable practice where possible in all our operations.

Dandelion Support Network adopts the tried and tested principles of reduce, reuse and recycle. At the core of our operations is a huge effort to reduce landfill by rehoming and, where required, repurposing baby goods. Our commitment to the environment extends beyond this, with our processes and procedures consciously undertaken in a manner that where possible, contributes to further sustainability.

To ensure that the goods we provide are of the highest quality and meet current Australian safety standards we of course are not able to rehome all donations. Where possible, we first seek other suitable uses for the item.

We have been fortunate to establish partnerships with other local groups who can make use of items such as cots that do not pass our standards and reuse the materials for various building projects.

Whilst we officially do not accept soft toys, Dandelion Support Network takes every effort to

clean and ensure toys donated are appropriate to pass on. Where soft toys fail our quality control, we have an arrangement in place to pass these on to Guide Dogs Australia who then repurpose these for dog training.

Dandelion Support Network goes to great efforts to operate as a paperless office. This work includes custom applications for smart phones for volunteer registration, safety checks and progress as well as stocktake and inventory.

We always encourage recipients of our services to return packaging to us for reuse where possible. Additionally in our packaging for storage and other purposes we maximise the use of reusable

container and bag options and we avoid use of disposable materials.

Most recently, we have also established great partnerships with Peninsular Toys Recyclers and Thorndale Foundation to assist with toys and clothes, our most donated items. With these partnerships in place, not only has our own waste been minimised, but we are also able to support these wonderful community organisations with their own operations.

As a team, our volunteers are encouraged to not only consider sustainability in their volunteering work but also in their everyday living.

Maureen became involved with Dandelion Support Network after seeing a notice in the newspaper calling for volunteers. She then became involved with the Management Team and three years later, regards this as her third career, albeit as a volunteer, working with an amazing group of committed people. Maureen now takes responsibility for the clothing packs for children

from 1 year to 14 as well as coordinating the Christmas gifts that we provide to children in need, through the agencies we work with.

Maureen spent some 30 years as a Secondary School Teacher, mostly in Special Education and held two Head Teacher, Special Education, positions for a total of 13 years. She took early retirement and started her second career as Assistant Coordinator of Gympsea Neighbour Aid.

She has also worked as a Management Committee member for several organisations. Her current volunteer positions are: Coordinator, Social Support Group, Gympsea Neighbour Aid; "Friend" of Gympsea Rotary Club; Dandelion Support Network.

Danielle Ruming

Danielle first heard of the Dandelion Support Network in



early 2012 after reading an article about the organisation in the local newspaper. It was a perfect match. Danielle was looking for volunteer work at the time and Dandelion desperately required help in managing the growing demand for their wonderful services.

After helping out at the very first donation day (held in the rain), Danielle has been volunteering with them ever since. Initially washing and sorting clothes and linen and making up breast pump packs, she is now actively involved in the day to day running, having been a committee member for the past 2 years while actively tracking and safety checking various items.

Danielle previously worked in customer service in the financial industry. She is a full-time mum and also volunteers at her children's school. She has a wonderful husband who has also generously donated his time to assist with IT needs for the organisation and two beautiful girls. Danielle takes pride in knowing the joy and support Dandelion brings to less fortunate families in need.

Katherine Wong

Katherine looks after car seats and capsules for Dandelion. She owns a Hire for Baby franchise, which hires and installs car restraints, among other baby equipment, so her knowledge of past and present models is invaluable when receiving child restraints that have been donated. Safety is her highest priority, so that is always front of mind when safety checking preloved car seats to make sure they are suitable to be rehomed.



Katherine lives with her husband and 6 year old son in the St George area, which they love. She first got to know about Dandelion through a friend who liked the Facebook page, and Katherine quickly responded to an urgent call out. To hear that a mother could not be with her 2 month old baby until the baby had somewhere safe to sleep broke her heart, and she donated a bassinet that she wasn't going to be using again. And hence her involvement began.



Kirsty Mason

Dandelion Support Network started for Kirsty in April 2012, after reading about it on Facebook. Kirsty loved the idea of sorting clothes and baby items and getting things into order – her inner Virgo was singing (and still does).

Kirsty had thought about setting up a Young Women's Breast Cancer support group after going through this herself in April 2009, when her first son was 14 months old. Dandelion however became her new passion and she is glad as it enabled her to step away from the Breast Cancer world a little. She tells her husband, Scott, that Dandelion is her therapy. Sorting and packing can be chaotic, but she loves the sense of achievement from making up packs for families in need. Kirsty first started making up clothing packs in her home but is now the Toy and Linen Manager and coordinates all these items with other volunteers. She loves that through Dandelion, her sons will see the value of volunteer work in their community.

Katrina Bosco

Katrina joined the volunteer team after reading about Dandelion in the local paper. She started by hosting working bees in her own home as well as generously offering much needed storage space. Katrina quickly became involved in fundraising and has initiated some of our great partnerships with supporting businesses.



Katrina has a background in marketing and business, skills shared often with the Dandelion team. She is mother to two young girls and her husband is also an active supporter of Dandelion through his business, Dynaweld.

Gabrielle Humphreys

Gabrielle joined Dandelion 2 years ago as Grants Officer after hearing



Dandelion needed help writing grants. The work was so rewarding that in December 2013 she took on the role of President and since then has been kept very busy with not only grant writing, but also social engagements and the general running of Dandelion.

Gabrielle has a PhD in Molecular genetics, a Diploma in Public Relations and 14 years' experience in the not-for-profit area – all of which have provided invaluable skills for her role as President. Currently she is a stay at home mum who runs a small sewing business and juggles parenting a five year old son, and twin three year old girls with her husband David.

Fiona Donovan

Fiona is a regular volunteer who helps sort pre-loved clothes, will check and clean second-hand bottle sterilizers, making sure there is a pair of tongs in every one. As well as clothes, Fiona also sorts, cleans and fills nappy bags for parents in need. From donations she is able to make sure that essential baby items, safety items, dummies, nursing pads etc are all put in the bags.



Fiona is a 59 year old mother of 4 and nanna of 2. She has always enjoyed helping people and is a community visitor to people in nursing homes, which she has done for ten years.

Fiona says that the other volunteers and the great atmosphere at Dandelion make it a happy and rewarding place to come to.

Nicole Howard

Nicole began volunteering with Dandelion in 2013 after seeing



everything that Dandelion provided to a family through another local organisation. She was touched by the difference that made to the family in very difficult circumstances and wanted to get involved.

Nicole shares the administrative work with Sarah liaising with caseworkers and donors and helps with all day to day running of the organisation. Nicole lends a hand wherever she is needed, collating requests for collection and looks after cots and bassinets, safety checks toys or sorts clothes.

Nicole is currently studying Primary Teaching.

CASE STUDY | One mother's journey with Dandelion

Two years ago I had just left my violent husband with nothing but my ten month old daughter, very few possessions and I was heavily pregnant. I was scared, broke and didn't know where I was going to live or how I was going to cope. Through the social worker who was assisting me at the hospital, Dandelion donated a cot mattress for my newborn son and three packs of newborn nappies.

As a result of their donation, my son had somewhere safe to sleep when I brought him home from the hospital, good quality nappies to wear and took a huge amount of stress off my shoulders. This kind act from strangers gave me faith that I was taking the right steps in leaving such an abusive relationship. The knowledge that strangers were willing to help me in my time of need gave me strength when I felt like giving up.

Two years later I have two beautiful children, two TAFE diplomas, completed a semester at Uni with a distinction average and take part in the Advanced Business Leadership program as part of my degree. I also volunteer with Dandelion, running my own charitable organisation that aims to give back to women who are in the position that I was two years ago. It's still a tough road ahead but my children and I are safe and it had a lot to do with Dandelion donating something that to most of us would seem inconsequential.

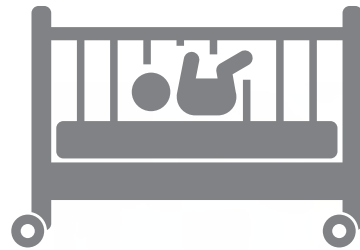
